

### THE DEGREE

Why do some countries acquire nuclear weapons while others do not? How has the use of private forces in Iraq affected democracy in the U.S.? How do illegal immigrants acquire citizenship through illegal paperwork? Why are NGOs sometimes a force for good in global politics and other times not? UCI's international studies (IS) scholars investigate global issues to contribute to solutions that positively impact citizens around the world.

### RESEARCH

More than 100 UCI faculty members from the social sciences, humanities, social ecology, business and beyond have research interests in international and global affairs. This base of expertise places UCI among the leading educational institutions in the world. The major draws upon all these faculty members to offer a rich curriculum and range of activities focused on global issues.

### **CAREERS**

IS majors acquire cutting-edge analytical skills and knowledge that enable them to understand and contribute to the rapidly evolving global community. They go on to careers in international affairs, diplomacy, law, public policy, business, NGOs and academic research and teaching.

### INTERNATIONAL STUDIES AT UCI

The honors program in international studies provides qualified students an opportunity to pursue specialized research in an area of their choosing.

UCI's Gamma Gamma Chapter of the International Studies National Honors Society was established in 2006 primarily as a means by which to honor those students who have excelled academically and to foster an understanding of world affairs.

The International Studies Public Forum is a bi-weekly lecture series to present new ideas or research. It is also offered as a two unit undergraduate class.

The minor in conflict resolution offers an interdisciplinary curriculum in conflict resolution that also includes training to become a certified mediator in the State of California.

Certificates in mediation and the Olive Tree Initiative provide opportunities to learn about conflict resolution with hands-on mediation experience in Orange County, and conflict resolution in the context of the Israeli Palestinian conflict, complete with a visit the region.

International studies majors are strongly encouraged to study abroad through the Education Abroad Program or International Opportunities Program for a quarter, summer or year.

<sup>5</sup>The Honors Program is open to all juniors and senior international studies majors with an overall GPA of 3.0 and an international studies major GPA of 3.5 who have completed International Studies 11, 13, 14 and two upper division courses.
